URBANA CITY COUNCIL REGULAR SESSION MEETING TUESDAY, MARCH 5, 2019

President Hess called the City of Urbana Regular Session Meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. City staff attending: Mayor Bill Bean, Director of Administration Kerry Brugger, Director of Finance Chris Boettcher, Director of Law Mark Feinstein, and Zoning Officer Adam Moore.

PRESIDENT CALLED ROLL: Mr. Fields, absent; Mr. Hoffman, absent; Mr. Paul, present; Mr. Scott, present; Mr. Thackery, present; and Mr. Piper, present.

President Hess led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MINUTES of the Regular Session Meeting Minutes February 19, 2018, were presented for approval. Mr. Thackery moved for the approval of said minutes and Mr. Paul seconded. Voice vote on approval: all ayes, nays, none. Motion passed 4-0.

Mr. Piper stated that this ordinance was designed to stop the act of blowing grass clippings in the streets for safety purposes as well as keeping the clippings out of the Stormwater areas. He also added that it looks bad as well. President Hess stated that this ordinance was like the dog poop law, to which has never been enforced and he would hate to put the burden of enforcement on the police department or zoning department. Mr. Piper stated that he was just doing his job as a councilman. President Hess declared this ordinance to have its first reading.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS/WORK SESSION

Mr. Paul reminded everyone that the City does not pick up sticks. Mr. Brugger advised that the Compost Facility will open on March 15, 2019, and citizens could drop off sticks free of charge.

Mr. Moore spoke of the Vacant Building Registration Program. He stated that there would be a newsletter going out to the public and the City plans to administer this, beginning this month. He advised that a tab has been put on the website and the form is also available on the website. He added that there were approximately 70 structures that are vacant and they would be doing the most egregious ones first.

Ms. Boettcher said that a 3x5 post card would be going out reminding everyone to file their taxes by April 15, 2019. She also added that a letter went out in the utility bill reminding everyone of the same.

Mr. Brugger gave credit to Mr. Moore about getting the Ordinance of Vacant Properties back up and running. He also stated that Lawnview was working with the Park Board, on a project they would like to launch this year. They are wanting to build a playground to allow children of all levels of abilities and disabilities to play together.

Mayor Bean thanked Mr. Pena for his role on Council.

President Hess stated that Mr. Pena's seat is now open, and that Council would be accepting application through March 15, 2019. He continued about the Charter Review and advised that a letter would be going out scheduling the first meeting of the Charter Review.

Mr. Paul moved to excuse absent members Mr. Fields and Mr. Hoffman. Mr. Scott seconded. Voice vote on approval: all ayes, nays, none.

Motion passed 4-0.

URBANA CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION MINUTES TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2019

President Hess called the work session to order at 6:00 p.m.

Present for the Work Session were: Mr. Fields, Mr. Scott, Mr. Piper, Mr. Hoffman, Mayor Bean, Mr. Brugger, Ms. Boettcher, Mr. Feinstein, Mr. Crabill and Mrs. Bailey.

Mr. Crabill began with the first topic being the Q3 Project. He stated that the Jobs Ohio Grant is in the amount of \$883,947.00, the City's portion is \$348,435.00 and True Inspection Service's amount was \$116,145.00 He also stated that Honeywell was a potential responsible party and that they had completed their remediation las spring. He also advised that the groundwater monitoring wells have been installed and that they will start monitoring the same and it must meet VAP Standards. He also stated that there were 19 plus acres involved with this property and the City took ownership in 2017 through the tax foreclosure process. He stated that all the remedial work should be wrapping up in the next few months. He also advised that \$18,663.82 of the City's portion has not been spent and that Council would be approached for more funding approval to finish the project. He said that they were looking at the amount being between \$45,000.00 and \$75,000.00 to be requested. He also stated that the east side of the property would go to True Inspection Services. Mr. Brugger added that Jobs Ohio is now seeing the value and vision that the City had. Mrs. Bailey said that Jobs Ohio would be putting a presentation together using the Q3 Project in that presentation. She also advised that 20% of the property could be used for something other than manufacturing. Mayor Bean stated that there was the option of leaving 20 acres of dirty property in the City, but the City wanted to do this project to bring more jobs and cleaning up the area. Mayor Bean also thanked Mrs. Bailey and the CEP for all of their hard work into completing this project. President Hess asked if the west side of the property was marketable since the City now owns it and was advised by Mrs. Bailey that it was very much marketable.

Mr. Crabill then spoke on the second topic, Phase II Water Project. He began by stating the Phase I Water Project was completed in 2015, and construction would begin in the summer of 2020 for Phase II. He also advised that they were looking into an automated meter reading system.

Mr. Crabill then spoke on the next topic, Lodging Tax. He stated that the current tax is at 3% for the County, for which they receive, 3% for the City, which is not yet collected, for a total of 6%. He also stated that it had to stay at 3% per the ORC. He also mentioned that 50% of the revenue goes to the Visitor's Bureau and that 50% would go to the General Fund. He stated that the current resolution would need to be repealed and replaced with and ordinance, and by updating this, the City would be in control of the collection of the same.

Mr. Crabill then spoke on the topic of Community Revitalization. He stated that the City's population is 11,405 and the City can have 1 D5 liquor license per 2000 residents. He stated that there are current 6 D5 licenses in use. He stated that the City was looking into the B-3 district and changing it to promote economic growth. He stated by changing the district, it could add 12-13 new D5L Licenses, which would accommodate restaurants with liquor. Mr. Hoffman stated that he believed this was worth looking into. He also added that people do not want to live in a City where there is nothing to do. President Hess asked how big the district would be and was advised by Mrs. Bailey that it would serve the downtown area only.

Mr. Feinstein spoke on the topic of Home Rule. He gave a detailed presentation on the Home Rule, what it means and how Council can use it. He added that we should keep the discussion of Home Rule going.

Miscellaneous Business

Mr. Scott spoke about the concrete contractor. He spoke about the Home Rule and how this opens up a new avenue.

Mr. Crabill spoke about the City Engineer and how this Home Rule discussion could affect him.

Mrs. Boettcher stated that the Tax Incentive Review is scheduled for next Thursday.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT ANNUAL REPORT 2018 GENERAL INFORMATION

The Champaign County Municipal Court presents the Annual Report for the year 2018 to the Citizens of Champaign County, the Mayor and the City of Urbana, the Urbana City Council, and the Champaign County Commissioners.

The Court was presided over by the Honorable G.S. Weithman, who, as of January 1, 2014, was serving his first term in office as Municipal Court Judge.

The Champaign County Municipal Court has county-wide jurisdiction and became a full time court in January of 2002.

In 2018, Champaign County Municipal Court employed one Clerk of Court, one bookkeeper, six Deputy Clerks, one full-time Bailiff, and one part-time Bailiff. The Probation Department is staffed by two full time employees and one part-time employee. The Probation Department was once again funded completely through a state grant and probation fees secured by the Court. The Probation office continues to thrive handling 266 new diversion cases in 2018.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 CRIMINAL DIVISION

Arraignments were held in the traffic and criminal division of the Champaign County Municipal Court on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 9:00 a.m. Defendants incarcerated in the Tri-County Regional Jail were arraigned via a video link with the Court every day generally at 8:30 am.

Pretrials, court trials, and motion hearings in the Traffic and Criminal Division were generally held starting at 8:00 a.m. and continue to 4:00 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays and from 1:00 p.m.- 4:00 p.m. on Wednesdays. Jury trials were normally held on Thursdays.

Inmates were usually transported for court trials, motion hearings and jury trials. Law enforcement agencies and the Tri-County Jail, generally provide these transports.

There were 1,045 cases with 1,512 violations of misdemeanor criminal offenses in the Champaign County Municipal Court in 2018.

There were 94 cases with 157 violations of new felony cases filed in the Champaign County Municipal Court in 2018. There were 12 jury trials in 2018.

A more detailed breakdown of criminal charges filed by arresting agencies and the financial information pertaining to these charges follows later in this report.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 TRAFFIC DIVISION

The Traffic Division held regular arraignments at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. Arraignments conducted via video link to the Tri-County Regional Jail were held at generally 8:30 a.m. every day.

There were 2,646 cases with 3.091 violations of traffic offenses filed in the Champaign County Municipal Court in 2018.

There were a total of 158 cases of OVI involving 392 violations in 2018.

The Champaign County Municipal Court processed a total of 37 parking tickets in 2018.

A more detailed breakdown of traffic charges filed by arresting agencies and the financial information pertaining to these charges follows later in this report.

The Champaign County Municipal Court handled a total of 3,980 cases with 5,189 violations in the Traffic and Criminal Divisions. As this statistic reflects, this Court continues to process a large volume of cases and endeavors to do so quickly and efficiency.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 CIVIL DIVISION

The Civil Division of the Champaign County Municipal Court held hearings on Wednesdays. These hearings included pretrials, trials, motion hearings, Forcible Entry and Detainer Actions and damage hearings. Debtor's exams, garnishments and bank attachments are also scheduled through the Civil Division.

There were 991 cases in the Civil Division of the Champaign County Municipal Court in 2018.

A breakdown of case types and financial distributions follows later in this report.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 SMALL CLAIMS DIVISION

The Small Claims Division of the Champaign County Municipal Court held hearings on Wednesdays.

There were 30 cases in the Small Claims Division of the Court in 2018.

The Small Claims Division does not hold jury trials.

A breakdown of case types and financial distributions follow later in this report.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 TRUSTEESHIP DIVISION

The Champaign County Municipal Court Trusteeship Division handles several cases per year.

There were 6 current Trusteeships.

A breakdown of the financial distribution to the City of Urbana follows later in this report.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MUNICIPAL COURT 2018 PROBATION DEPARTMENT

The Probation Department of the Champaign County Municipal Court is funded solely by a grant from the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction.

The Probation Department supervises those defendants that have been sentenced to a jail term, but have all or part of that jail sentence conditionally suspended. This department oversees these conditions which may include but are not limited to Driver's Intervention Programs, Remedial Driving Courses, Counseling, Community Service, Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, employment or training, and High School Diplomas.

The Champaign County Municipal Court Probation Department's electronic monitoring program utilizes the electronic monitoring system called Sober-Link. This unit transmits data via a cellular connection as land lines are nearly obsolete. The program allows placement of defendants on "house arrest" in lieu of jail time.

The defendants are required to pay all fees for the use of the monitoring devices, plus a monthly probation fee. The Probation Department secures the ankle bracelets on the defendants and assures that they meet all the requirements and conditions set down by the Court. A total of 847 electronic monitored days were successfully completed in 2018.

In 2018, the Probation Department had 266 new cases with 215 successful terminations and 73 unsuccessful terminations for a total of 288 terminated cases in 2018.

The department had 4 graduates to obtain a diploma or GED for a total of 321 since the program began in 1996.

Defendants worked 140 Community Service hours as a condition of Probation in 2018.

Public service workers completed 243 hours during 2018 to work off Fines and Court Costs for a total of \$2,016.00.

The Champaign County Municipal Court Probation Department ended the year with a total of \$86,982.71 in the probation fee and electronic monitoring fee funds. The Probation Department is funded by a 2 year grant of \$174,652.00. In accordance with O.R.C. 321.44, these fees may only be used by the Probation Department and may not be used by the City of Urbana.



This engagement letter between the City Council and Management of City of Urbana, referred to here on out as the City and the Auditor of State sets forth the nature and scope of the services we will provide, the City's required involvement and assistance in support of our services, the related fee arrangements, and other terms and conditions designed to ensure that our professional services achieve the City's objectives.

Summary of Services

We will examine the City of Urbana, Champaign County management's assertion that the census data and pensionable wages reported to the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund as of December 31, 2017, and for the year then ended was accurate and complete. The specific census data and detailed assertions are described in the responsible party assertions and representations included below. The objectives of our examination are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the census data reported to the Retirement System is complete and accurate; and to express an opinion as to whether management's assertions regarding the completeness and accuracy of the census data reported to the Retirement System are fairly stated, in all material respects.

Our examination will be conducted in accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' Attestation Standards for examination engagements and applicable attestation engagement standards included in the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. Accordingly, it will include examining, on a test basis, your records and other procedures to obtain evidence necessary to enable us to express an opinion on the assertions that the City provided complete and accurate census data to the Retirement System as described in the responsible party assertions and representations below.

We cannot provide assurance that an unmodified opinion will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for use to modify our opinion. If our opinion is other than unmodified, we will discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason we are unable to complete the examination or are unable to form or have not formed an opinion, we may disclaim an opinion on the assertions of completeness and accuracy of the census data provided to the Retirement System, or may withdraw from this engagement. In this unlikely event, we will communicate the reason for disclaiming an opinion or withdrawing from the engagement to you, and to those charged with governance, in writing.

Because of the inherent limitations of an examination engagement, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, an unavoidable risk exists that some material misstatements may not be detected, even though the examination is properly planned and performed in accordance with the attestation standards.

Our engagement will not include a detailed inspection of census data for all employees and cannot be relied on to disclose all material errors, or known and suspected fraud or noncompliance with laws or regulations, or internal control deficiencies, that may exist. However, we will inform you of any known or suspected fraud and noncompliance with laws or regulations, internal control deficiencies identified during the engagement, and uncorrected misstatements that come to our attention unless clearly trivial.

If we find indications of abuse, we will expand our tests to determine the impact on the completeness and accuracy of the census data provided to the Retirement System. Government Auditing Standards defines abuse as behavior which while not necessarily a legal violation, is behavior a prudent person would deem improper or deficient. Because this determination is subjective, Government Auditing Standards does not expect practitioners to provide reasonable assurance of detecting abuse.

We understand that you will provide us with the basic information required for our examination and that you are responsible for the accuracy and completeness of that information. We may advise you about appropriate criteria or assist in the development of the subject matter, but the responsibility for the subject matter remains with you.

Your Responsibilities

We will perform the examination assuming management and those charged with governance acknowledge and understand they are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of the census data provided to the Retirement System. The specific, detailed assertions are described in the Responsible Party Assertions and Representations below.

You are also responsible for:

- Informing us of events occurring or facts discovered subsequent to December 31, 2017, of which
 management may become aware, that may affect the completeness and accuracy of the census data
 provided to the Retirement System.
- 2. Reporting fraud and noncompliance of which you are aware to us.

Responsible Party Assertions and Representations

Prior to issuing our report, we will request written representations from you acknowledging, to the best of your knowledge and belief, your responsibility for management's assertions that:

- The census data provided to the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund as of December 31, 2017 is accurate and complete. Census data includes
 - First and Last Name;
 - Last four digits of the social security number;
 - o Contributions remitted to the plan;
 - o Pensionable Compensation.
- The census data provided to the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund as of December 31, 2017 included all enrolled employees.
- Census data changes occurring during the year ended December 31, 2017 to an enrolled employee's eligible compensation, were properly updated with Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund.
- All employees required to be enrolled in the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund in accordance with statutory requirements were properly enrolled.
- The total pensionable wages and employee contributions information reported to the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund for the year ended December 31, 2017 agrees with the payroll records of the employer.

We will also request written representations from you acknowledging, to the best of your knowledge and belief, your responsibility for:

- Complying with any applicable laws and regulations we have tested as part of our procedures.
- Making all records and documentation related to the reporting of the census data and pensionable wages to the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund available to us
- Communicating known deficiencies in internal control relevant to the engagement.
- Documentation supporting compliance with laws and regulations we will test as part of our procedures available to us.
- Other matters for which we may request written representations.

If you fail to provide the necessary written assertions, we are required to withdraw from the engagement. In this situation, no report will be issued.

Engagement Team

The engagement will be led by:

- * Donna Waldron, Chief Auditor, and Scott Bowser, Assistant Chief Auditor, who will be responsible for assuring the overall quality, value, and timeliness of our services to you;
- Megan Hall, Senior Audit Manager, who will be responsible for managing the delivery of our services to you;
 and
- * Emily Jenkins, Audit Manager, who will be responsible for on-site administration of our services to you.

Access to Records

To help meet our mutual objectives, the City will provide to us in a timely manner accounting records, schedules and supporting information (an initial list of which we will furnish to you), as well as working space and clerical assistance as mutually agreed upon and as is normal and reasonable in the circumstances. When and if for any reason the City is unable to provide these schedules, information or assistance, the Auditor of State and the City will mutually revise the fee to reflect additional costs, if any, required to achieve these objectives.

Confidential Information:

You should redact personal information from all documents (paper or electronic) you provide to the AOS related to our services including financial records and reports, payroll records, employee rosters, health and medical records, tax records, etc. Personal information includes social security numbers, dates of birth, drivers' license numbers or personal financial institution account numbers. The City should redact all personal information from electronic records before you transmit them to the AOS. This information should be fully blacked out in all paper documents prior to sending to the AOS. If you cannot redact personal information from any records or documents you must identify these records to us.

If redacting this personal information compromises our procedures, the City and the AOS will consider these exceptions on a case-by-case basis. Additionally, if redacting this information creates a hardship on you in terms of resources, recordkeeping or other issues, the City and the AOS may collaborate on alternative methods of providing the City's data to the AOS without compromising the personal information of individuals served by the City. The AOS is willing to work with you. It is our intent to minimize the amount of personal information we require. It is important that you review internal policies to find ways to eliminate as much personal information from financial records as possible by substituting non-personal information (i.e., change social security numbers

Fee

Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance

Action: Marty Hess called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

Reading of Rules of the Meeting and Swearing-In of Witnesses

Action: Marty Hess read the rules of the meeting and swore in all witnesses at the meeting.

Prior Meeting Minutes

Action: Skip Mintchell made a motion to approve the meeting minutes from December 10, 2018.

Lisa Haulman seconded the motion.

Discussion: None.

Vote: 5-0, motion passed.

New Business – Application(s)

Case # 1:

BZA-2019-001 – 904 Scioto Street – Jaime Houseman – Mercy Health Urbana Hospital

Variance from Chapter 1129.10(b)(2) to construct a wall that is 12' in height.

Application: Lisa Haulman read the application to the Board.

Staff Comments

Adam Moore provided background information and read the staff report to the Board.

& Recommendations:

Testimony in Favor: Jaime Houseman (Mercy Health Urbana Hospital) explained that this is a request for a front façade and to

have the main entrance from Scioto Street. Currently, the main entrance is through the emergency department which causes a flow issues for many patients. This project will provide a new front entrance for the community, which will be easily accessible and more convenient. The new entrance will also create a new

modern image for the hospital.

Stephen Sharp (McCall Sharp Architecture) added that they are planning to do a covered drop off for patients' comfort and needs especially during inclement weather. The proposed walls will have steps upwards towards

the entrance, not only to mask the machinery in front of the building but also to draw your eyes towards the main entrance. Mr. Sharp pointed out that there is a slight modification to the wall height from twelve feet as requested on the application to nine feet in height at its highest point. The wall will be made of bricks that match the hospital's current material and will have an added stone element on top.

Testimony Against:

None.

Discussion:

Charlie Zerkle asked if there are mechanical equipment on both the left and right side of the building. Mr. Sharp answered that mechanical equipment is only on the right side. The left side is just a recess with windows. The wall will be placed on both sides to create symmetry. Mr. Zerkle inquired if there will be a sound issue from the mechanical equipment. Mr. Sharp answered that mechanical equipment is an emergency generator that will not be running often.

Lisa Haulman had no questions or additional comments. Adam Moore explained to the Board that since the highest point of the wall has been decreased from twelve feet to nine feet, the variance requested is now only a one-foot variance as per the eight feet height maximum allowable for businesses. Skip Mintchell stated that he likes the concept and the wall will add a classy addition to the hospital. Bryant Heflin agreed with Mr. Mintchell and had no additional questions.

Marty Hess asked how far out the wall will be from the main structure. Craig Genet (McCall Sharp Architecture) explained that the intention for the wall on the left is to build over the current retaining wall. The wall on the right will be built about fifteen to eighteen feet from the retaining wall. Currently, there are parking spaces on the right side, which will be removed. Mr. Genet explained that the canopy will extend about fifty feet from the existing building.

Action:

Skip Mintchell made a motion to approve the application as presented with the modification that the highest point of the wall as nine feet.

Bryant Heflin seconded the motion.

Vote:

5-0, motion passed.

Case # 2:

BZA-2019-002 - Washington Avenue (Parcel ID: #K48-25-00-03-06-191-00)

Conditional Use Application in accordance with Chapter 1120.04(e) to allow the harboring of 2-4 horses.

Application:

Lisa Haulman read the application to the Board.

Staff Comments &

Recommendations:

Adam Moore provided background information and read the staff report to the Board. Mr. Moore also referred to Chapter 505.15 regarding keeping livestock in the city. The application is brought to the BZA due to the fact that the request is for a conditional use on the property. Part of the land is located on the highest conveyance of flow as per FEMA, which is not allowed to be built on. The parcel currently does not have an address, however, if the application is approved, the City's Engineer will issue an address.

Testimony in Favor:

Doug Hauser (Washington Avenue) explained that the intention for the land purchase was to retire on the property and to have his horses with him. Mr. Hauser has spoken to the County's Engineer and he was able to provide some options to address the flooding issue.

Testimony Against:

A letter from Suzanne Bentley (600 Dorothy Moore Ave. Unit 7) states that she is concerned with the request due to the fact that the property is in very close in proximity to the other houses on three sides of the property. The letter then outlines the concerns.

- 1. Health concerns related to increasing exposure to insects from the horses. The accumulating manure harbors micro-organisms and insects that can travel to nearby properties which can cause harm to the public.
- 2. The timely removal of manure and odor it may cause.

- 3. The horses will aggravate Ms. Bentley's dog which will view the horses as a threat, in response the dog will bark and chase the horses.
- 4. The horses will attract nearby vermin and rodents.
- 5. The size of the property may not be adequate for a house, a barn, and two to four horses.

Ms. Bentley feels that horses should not be living in residential areas.

Discussion:

Don Barger (519 N. Jefferson Ave.) stated that he has no problem with the livestock as long as they are taken care of; however, the property in question accumulates a lot of water. Mr. Barger then asked how the manure will be disposed of. Mr. Hauser answered that it will be hauled off. Mr. Barger also mentioned that the horses must be properly fenced. The fence must be far enough that passing children on Washington Avenue won't be able to play with them. Mr. Barger also explained that the area by Boyce Street also accumulates a lot of stagnant water. The property also has a lot of deer. Mr. Barger mentions that due to the close proximity of the other neighboring houses; they may have a problem with neighbors' complaints.

Skip Mintchell knew that the property had horses in the past and is not concern about the request. Mr. Mintchell is ok with the application request as long as it adheres to Chapter 505.15. Lisa Haulman agrees with the points made by the letter from Ms. Bentley. The odor will be a problem for the surrounding houses. Ms. Haulman agrees with Mr. Barger that the property does get a lot of deer, which can cause a problem. Ms. Haulman is not in favor of the application.

Charlie Zerkle has seen the property full of water. Mr. Zerkle confirmed that the Hauser will have a lot of standing water problems. Mr. Zerkle is also concerned about the fence that will be installed since there is no information regarding the fence provided with the application. Mr. Hauser answered that it will be a board fence. Mr. Hauser also states that due to his experience with construction, he will dig down and compact the soil where the house and barn will be located. The structures will also be placed on lifts. He will also address the water accumulation by working with the County's Engineer on a solution. Mr. Hauser intents to have tiles running to a catch basin and have the water pumped out by a sump pump into the creek which leads to the pond. Mr. Moore also explains that due to the property being in the special flood hazard area, the city must adhere to FEMA's regulations.

Bryant Heflin has a number of concerns with the flooding. Manure can get into the water and into the sump pump, etc. Mr. Heflin also does feel that this request is applicable to the specific parcel due to the number of surrounding residences. Mr. Heflin feels that there will be a lot of push back from the neighborhood. Based on the drawing, Mr. Heflin feels that the proposed barn is too big and does not fit for the area. The parcel is inadequate for the proposal and is not in the best interest of the public. Marty Hess stated that the drawing submitted does not have detailed information for what the applicants are requesting. Mr. Hess also mentions that all the water what will be pumped out will go into the city's parks and ponds which may cause an issue. In the past, the parcel was not within the city limit and the previous owners were able to have horses on the property. Once the land was included as part of the city, the horses were grandfathered to remain on the property. Mr. Hess feels that the application will be a problem and the tiles will not solve the flooding issue. Mr. Barger agrees that there is no place where the water can go and it either starts to pond or just soaks into the ground.

Action:

Skip Mintchell made a motion to accept the application as submitted.

Bryant Heflin seconded the motion.

Vote:

1-4, motion failed. Skip Mintchell was the lone "Yes" vote.

Miscellaneous Business

Department of Zoning and Compliance

Discussion: Kerry Brugger mentioned that there was a departmental restructure where Doug Crabill will be stepping away

from Zoning and Nuisance. Mr. Crabill will concentrate on Community Development and other projects. Adam Moore will assume Nuisance and Zoning in place of Mr. Crabill. Cat Tanujaya and Dan Shover will be working with Mr. Moore.

Mr. Moore shared that the BZA had a 35% increase in the applications in 2018. Last year there was also a 30% increase in permits issued. Mr. Brugger also mentioned that there's an uptick in the residential investment in 2018.

Bryant Heflin made a motion to adjourn at 7:07 PM.

On Monday, March 11, 2019 bids were accepted for the project referenced above. This project proposes work in Monument Square and one block in each direction along US 36 and US 68. This was a rebid of the project due to costs exceeding 110% of the Engineer's Estimate the first time. Three bids were read and R.B. Jergens Contractors, Inc. of Vandalia was the low bidder at a total bid price of \$1,808,913.09, coming in under the Engineer's Estimate of \$1,949,490.61.

Part of the requirement for bidding ODOT projects such as this is prequalification in the work types being performed. R.B. Jergens holds 35 prequalifications, including those needed for our project. Therefore, I recommend Urbana City Council accept the lowest and best bid submitted by R.B. Jergens Contractors, Inc. in the amount of \$1,808,913.09. A more specific funding breakdown is included in the purchase requisition, however, \$1,123,364.26 of the total will be grant funded, \$404,600.00 will be loan funded, and the remaining amount will come from local accounts (Capital, Stormwater, Sewer Maintenance, Water).

Urbana City Council,

On Monday, March 11, 2019 bids were accepted for the project referenced above. Five bids were read aloud. The contractor who had the apparent low bid overall was Strawser Paving Company, Inc. of Columbus, coming in at \$105,231.05. Bidders were advised that the amount of work bid would likely be reduced due to property owners completing their own repairs this spring. But the City also provided a minimum quantity of work based on items the City needed to complete before the streets are paved, such as installation of ADA ramps at intersections, a couple catch basin repairs and alleyway approach repairs. Based on the minimum work amounts, Strawser Paving would have also been the lowest bid.

Since Strawser Paving Company (not Strawser Construction who we worked with in 2015 and 2016) has not worked with Engineering in recent history, I referenced ODOT's prequalification list and found Strawser Paving has 21 prequalified work types, including those pertinent to their work here. Therefore, I recommend to Council that we accept the lowest and best bid submitted by Strawser Paving Company in the amount of \$105,231.05.

Intent of Memo & Recommendation

This memo provides Urbana City Council with the recommendations from the Tax Incentive Review Council (TIRC). Council must act on the recommendations during its 03/07/2019 meeting. If action is not taken by Council, the City cannot file its annual report on March 31st and the City will be fined \$500/report.

The Tax Incentive Review Council (TIRC) meets annually to review the Enterprise Zone Agreements and Post-1994 Community Reinvestment Area Agreements. Each agreement is different and is between the City and a company. Any company receiving a property tax incentive from the City agreed to a real property investment, creation of jobs, and/or retention of jobs. The TIRC meets annually to make sure the City and company are fulfilling their obligations under the agreement.

At 9:00 AM on Thursday, March 7, 2019, the TIRC met. The TIRC reviewed and evaluated the previous year's activities—2017 Taxes Paid in 2018—to determine if the companies receiving tax incentives are fulfilling their obligations with respect to investments and job creation/retention. A RESOLUTION ENACTED BY THE CITY OF URBANA, CHAMPAIGN COUNTY, OHIO, TO AUTHORIZE THE DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION TO MAKE APPLICATION TO THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION UNDER THE SMALL CITY PROGRAM FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO SOUTH HIGH STREET, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Burgess and Niple, Inc., under contract with the Clark County-Springfield Transportation Coordinating Committee in coordination with the Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission (LUC), finalized a study of the South High Street Corridor between Miami Street (US Route 36) and Lewis B. Moore Drive (State Route 55); and

WHEREAS, the corridor study was primarily focused on drainage improvements, bicycle and pedestrian improvements, parking improvements, and potential intersection improvements in order to provide a more inviting space for residents in the corridor and adjacent Urbana University campus; and

WHEREAS, the corridor study was completed/finalized in February of 2019; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana desires to turn the recommendations and concepts outlined in this study to develop a construction project that will result in improvements to South High Street; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana is an eligible Local Public Agency (LPA) who can apply for federal project funding through the Ohio Department of Transportation's Small City Program; and

WHEREAS, the Small City Program can be utilized for projects that rehabilitate pavements, widen roadways, add curbs and sidewalks, and construct utility infrastructure (if deemed necessary to the project); and

WHEREAS, the Ohio Department of Transportation's 2019 application cycle for the Small City Program for projects scheduled to begin in State Fiscal Year 2023 or after can provide up to 80% of eligible construction costs with the remaining 20% being borne by the LPA; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio Department of Transportation's Small City Program can provide up to \$2,000,000.00 in grant funding for this project which is estimated to cost \$3,875,469.00; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana plans to submit additional grant funding applications to the Ohio Department of Transportation's Transportation Alternatives Program and the Ohio Public Works Commission in order to secure sufficient grant funding to make this project a reality.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE URBANA CITY COUNCIL:

SECTION ONE: The Director of Administration is hereby empowered on behalf of the City of Urbana to prepare an execute an application for funding through the Small City Program for the stated described project and to submit same to the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation.

SECTION TWO: If the City of Urbana is awarded funds from the Small City Program for this project, the LPA shall commit to pay up to 20% of the estimated construction costs. This local portion shall be funded using Permissive Tax Funds, Capital Improvement Funds, or TIF funds. The LPA further agrees to pay One Hundred Percent (100%) of the construction cost over and above the maximum amount provided by the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation and for all costs associated with engineering plans, environmental studies and documentation, right-of-way plans, and right-of-way acquisition, and environmental remediation, if necessary.

SECTION THREE: The City of Urbana further commits to budgeting for and appropriating the required local match dollars required for the project.

SECTION FOUR: Upon completion of the described Project, and unless otherwise agreed, the LPA shall: (1) provide adequate maintenance for the described Project in accordance with all applicable state and federal laws, including, but not limited to, 23 USC 116; (2) provide ample financial provisions, as necessary, for the maintenance of the described Project; (3) if necessary, maintain the right-of-way, keeping it free of obstructions; and (4) if necessary, hold said right-of-way inviolate for public highway purposes.

SECTION FIVE: If the application is approved for funding through the Small City Program, the Director of Administration of said LPA is hereby empowered on behalf of the LPA to enter into a contract with the Director of the Ohio Department of Transportation that is necessary to complete the above described project.

SECTION SIX: This resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure to take effect and be in force immediately upon passage to protect and promote public safety by promoting the timely submission of an application for the Small City Program by the June 15, 2019 deadline.

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-01K created DriveOhio as the smart mobility center for the State of Ohio, housed within the Ohio Department of Transportation, tasked with promoting the development of autonomous and connected vehicle technology; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-04K established the Autonomous Vehicle Pilot Program (AVPP) to link municipalities interested in promoting autonomous vehicle technology to industry; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-04K tasks DriveOhio with partnering with municipalities that volunteer to participate in the AVPP, to identify the unique testing attributes of the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, Section 5501.03(A)(3) of the Ohio Revised Code provides the Director of Transportation may coordinate the activities of the Department of Transportation with other appropriate public authorities, to enter into contracts with such authorities as necessary to carry out its duties; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana hosted a meeting with DriveOhio in late February with local leaders representing multiple community partners to explore opportunities to partner with DriveOhio locally; and

WHEREAS, from this meeting, potential testing sites and attributes were identified that are unique to the city for this type of testing; and

WHEREAS, regionally and statewide, numerous municipalities are already partnering with DriveOhio; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana (the Municipality) desires to partner with DriveOhio through its Autonomous Vehicle Pilot Program (AVPP) to promote autonomous vehicle testing within the city.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Urbana, Ohio:

<u>Section 1</u>: That the City of Urbana and Urbana City Council desire to partner with DriveOhio to further promote autonomous vehicle testing within the City of Urbana.

<u>Section 2</u>: That the Director of Administration of the City of Urbana is authorized to enter into and sign a memorandum of agreement with DriveOhio to participate in the Autonomous Vehicle Pilot Program (AVPP).

Section 3: That the City of Urbana will determine, in coordination with DriveOhio, those areas that the Municipality would like to promote as autonomous vehicle testing sites.

<u>Section 4</u>: That the City of Urbana will determine, in coordination with DriveOhio, the unique attributes of the Municipality that can be used to promote testing within the Municipality.

<u>Section 5</u>: That the City of Urbana will work with DriveOhio to help to educate law enforcement and the public about autonomous vehicle testing that may occur within the Municipality.

Section 6: This ordinance shall be effective at the earliest time provided by law.




Smart Mobility Projects The Future of Smart Mobility Begins in Ohio

DriveOhio brings together those who are responsible for building infrastructure in Ohio with those who are developing autonomous, connected and unmanned aerial technologies. Current projects across Ohio include:

Smart Cities: As the winner of the U.S. Dept. of Transportation's first-ever "Smart City Challenge," Columbus is using its grant awards totaling \$50 million as seed funding for "Smart Columbus," a regional initiative to create a first-of-its-kind interconnected smart transportation system. Marysville, Ohio, is installing dedicated short-range communications units in 27 traffic signals across the city that will communicate with 1,500 vehicles outfitted with onboard units, improving traffic and pedestrian safety at these intersections. Meanwhile, other smart city use cases and projects are in development in most of the state's major cities.

Smart Corridors: On highways across the state, including the Ohio Turnpike, wireless roadside sensors, high-tech cameras, dedicated short-range communications units and fiber-optic connections are being deployed to better monitor and manage traffic conditions, while allowing open-road testing of autonomous and connected vehicles.


Autonomous Shuttles: Columbus, Dayton and Cincinnati are introducing self-driving shuttles to more efficiently move employees to work sites, expand mass transit options, and help develop the guidelines for future self-driving transit projects throughout the country.



Transportation Information Management System (TIMS): Across the state, transportation data pertaining to Ohio's roadway system is collected, analyzed and disseminated. From roadway information and priority snow routes, to traffic counts and transportation projects, all of this information is publicly available and accessible on laptops or smart phones, equipping Ohioans with better data to make better travel decisions.

Unmanned Aircraft Systems: The state is pushing drone research and smart mobility forward with the Ohio Unmanned Aircraft Systems Center in Springfield, developing a ground-based detect-and-avoid radar system for drones, and using unmanned aerial vehicles for monitoring traffic and road conditions.

Advanced Vehicle Testing: North America's largest independent automotive proving grounds, the Transportation Research Center (TRC), is located in Ohio. The TRC is home to the nation's only federal vehicle test laboratory and a new 540-acre SMART Center for testing autonomous and connected vehicles. The Ohio State University has several automotive research and testing facilities, including the Center for Automotive Research, which focuses on intelligent transportation systems and sustainable mobility.





MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN

DRIVEOHIO AND (insert name of THE MUNICIPALITY)

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (Agreement) is made between DriveOhio, acting by and through the Executive Director (hereinafter referred to as DRIVEOHIO), 1980 West Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43223 and (the Municipality) acting by and through (insert) (hereinafter referred to as the Municipality), (Municipality address).

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-01K created DriveOhio as the smart mobility center for the State of Ohio, housed within the Ohio Department of Transportation, tasked with promoting the development of autonomous and connected vehicle technology;

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-04K established the Autonomous Vehicle Pilot Program (AVPP), to link municipalities interested in promoting autonomous vehicle testing to industry;

WHEREAS, Executive Order 2018-04K tasks DriveOhio with partnering with municipalities that volunteer to participate in the AVPP, to identify the unique testing attributes of the Municipality;

WHEREAS, Section 5501.03(A)(3) of the Ohio Revised Code provides the Director of Transportation may coordinate the activities of the Department of Transportation with other appropriate public authorities, to enter into contracts with such authorities as necessary to carry out its duties;

WHEREAS the Municipality has volunteered to be a part of the AVPP by (passing an ordinance, executive order, etc.); and

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter stipulated to be kept and performed, it is agreed by the parties as follows:

SECTION I: RECITALS

The foregoing recitals are hereby incorporated as a material part of this Agreement

SECTION II: PURPOSE

This Agreement outlines the obligations and responsibilities of the Municipality and DriveOhio with regard to autonomous vehicle testing within the boundaries of the Municipality.

SECTION III: MUNICIPALITY OBLIGATIONS

- 1. The Municipality will determine, in coordination with DriveOhio, those areas the Municipality would like to promote as autonomous vehicle testing sites. These testing sites will not exclude autonomous vehicle testing in other areas, but will be those sites that the Municipality seeks to actively encourage testing. This can include:
 - a. Areas that have a specific need, i.e. first mile/last mile applications
 - b. Areas that are specific districts, i.e. entertainment or commercial districts
- 2. The Municipality will determine, in consultation with DriveOhio, the unique attributes of the Municipality that can be used to promote testing within the Municipality. These attributes may include:
 - a. Specific weather patterns
 - b. The availability of connected vehicle infrastructure
 - c. Population density
 - d. Geography
 - e. The presence of signalized intersection, roundabout, etc.
 - f. Any other unique attribute
- 3. The Municipality agrees that it will work with DriveOhio to help educate law enforcement that has authority within the jurisdiction of the Municipality as to the presence of autonomous vehicles. The Municipality will assist in educating law enforcement as to how to interact with the autonomous vehicles and how to react to public inquiries about the autonomous vehicles.

SECTION III: DRIVEOHIO OBLIGATIONS

- 1. DriveOhio agrees to publish the partnership status of the Municipality on its website and in any materials DriveOhio distributes to autonomous vehicle testers.
- 2. DriveOhio agrees to promote the unique attributes of the Municipality to all partner autonomous vehicle testers and to attempt to match autonomous vehicle testers with the Municipality based upon the attributes the tester is seeking.
- 3. DriveOhio will notify the Municipality, by contacting the contact person listed above, when any autonomous vehicle tester becomes a partner with DriveOhio, and will identify the unique attributes that tester is seeking.

- 4. DriveOhio will coordinate with the Municipality to continue to upgrade the unique attributes the Municipality possesses as it receives input from autonomous vehicle testers
- 5. DriveOhio will coordinate with the Municipality to educate law enforcement as to how to interact with Autonomous Vehicles.
- 6. DriveOhio will coordinate with the Municipality on any efforts to educate the public about the presence of autonomous vehicles within the Municipality.

SECTION IV: FINANCIAL RESOURCES

Nothing in this Agreement constitutes an obligation by DriveOhio, the Ohio Department of Transportation or the Municipality to provide any financial resources. Any agreement to provide financial resources will need to be stated in a separate document, signed by both parties.

SECTION V: TERM AND TERMINATION

This Agreement shall continue until the parties elect to terminate the Agreement. Either party may terminate the Agreement by giving ninety (90) days written notice to the other party.

SEXTION VII: MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 1. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties. No understandings, agreements, or representations, oral or written, not specified within this Agreement will be valid provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement may not be modified, supplemented or amended, in any manner, except by written agreement signed by both Parties.
- 2. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed, construed, and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio. To the extent that ODOT is a party to any litigation arising out of, or relating in any way to, this Agreement or the performance thereunder, such an action shall be brought only in a court of competent jurisdiction in Franklin County, Ohio.
- 3. Records Retention. All records regarding this Agreement shall be maintained for at least three years after the completion of this Agreement.
- 4. Severability. Any provision of this Agreement found to be prohibited by law shall be ineffective to the extent of such prohibition without invalidating the remainder of the Agreement.
- 5. Assignment. Neither this Agreement nor any rights, duties, or obligations described herein shall be assigned or subcontracted by either Party hereto without the prior express written consent of the other Party.
- 6. The Parties agree that no agency, employment, joint venture or partnership has been or will be created between DriveOhio or the Ohio Department of Transportation and the Municipality
- 7. Compliance with Laws.
 - A. Each of the Parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances, and all provisions required thereby to be included herein are hereby incorporated by reference. The enactment or modification of any applicable state or federal statute or the promulgation of rules or regulations there under, after execution of this Agreement shall be reviewed by the State and the Parties to determine whether the provisions of this Agreement require formal modification.
 - B. Each of the Parties represents and warrants that the Parties and their subcontractors, if any, shall obtain and maintain all required permits, licenses, registrations and approvals, as well as comply with all health, safety, and environmental statutes, rules, or regulations in the performance of work activities under this agreement.

Failure to do so may be deemed a material breach of this Agreement and grounds for termination and denial of further work with the State.

- C. Negligent Acts or Omissions. To the extent permitted by Ohio law, including but not limited to the Ohio Constitution, Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2743 et seq. and Ohio Revised Code Section 3345.40, each Party agrees to be responsible for those damages or losses, which arise directly from the negligent acts or omissions of its own employees in performance of the agreement.
- 9. Title to inventions conceived or reduced to practice by Drive Ohio or its personnel related to, pertaining to, or in connection with this Agreement shall be the property of Drive Ohio. The copyright to all materials prepared by Drive Ohio shall belong to Drive Ohio. Drive Ohio shall notify Municipality prior to the incorporation of Municipality materials or services in reference to materials developed by Drive Ohio that mention or reference Municipality services.
- 10. Any list of attributes or testing sites provided by the city can become attachments to this agreement once provided to DriveOhio, if not already exhibits.

SECTION VIII: SIGNATURES

Any person executing this agreement in a representative capacity hereby warrants that he/she has been duly authorized by his/her principal to execute this agreement on such principal's behalf.

Any party hereto may deliver a copy of its counterpart signature page to this Agreement via fax or e-mail. Each party hereto shall be entitled to rely upon a facsimile signature of any other party delivered in such a manner as if such signature were an original.

A RESOLUTION TO INDICATE LOCAL SUPPORT OF AN APPLICATION BY THE DEVELOPERS OF LEGACY PLACE TO THE OHIO HISTORIC PRESERVATION TAX CREDIT PROGRAM, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Douglas Inn on Monument Square at 111 Miami Street in downtown Urbana has been vacant and underutilized since at least 2007; and

WHEREAS, the Urbana City School District has completed its project to construct new school buildings for the students of the Urbana community; and

WHEREAS, South Elementary School at 725 South Main Street and North Elementary at 626 North Russell Street are no longer needed for educational purposes by the district and may be subject to demolition as a result; and

WHEREAS, Flaherty and Collins Properties is working to redevelop the Douglas Inn, South Elementary School, and North Elementary School for approximately 51 units of affordable senior housing as part of a larger community partnership; and

WHEREAS, redevelopment of these existing buildings for new senior housing is the preferred alternative for these buildings versus demolition of these buildings and the creation of vacant land at these sites; and

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana strongly supports the continued development of this project and an application being submitted by Flaherty and Collins Properties or its affiliates to the Ohio Development Services Agency's Ohio Historic Preservation Tax Credit Program; and

WHEREAS, Flaherty and Collins Properties or its affiliates can earn points on their competitive application for an Ohio Historic Preservation Tax Credit through the Ohio Development Services Agency by demonstrating local support of their application.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE URBANA CITY COUNCIL:

<u>Section 1</u>: That the City of Urbana and Urbana City Council strongly support the efforts of Flaherty and Collins Properties or its affiliates to obtain the necessary financing resources that are available through the Ohio Development Services Agency's Ohio Historic Preservation Tax Credit Program.

<u>Section 2</u>: That the City of Urbana and Urbana City Council strongly support the adaptive reuse of the historic structures known locally as the Douglas Inn, South Elementary, and North Elementary for new, affordable housing for seniors as part of the Legacy Place project by Flaherty and Collins Properties or its affiliates.

<u>Section 3</u>: That this Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure as this redevelopment project protects public health, safety, and welfare by restoring vacant buildings to productive use within the community.
